Jessup Celebrates its Italian Heritage with Steamtown's "La Festa dei Ceri" Excursion

Steamtown National Historic Site will run a diesel-powered train excursion to the Borough of Jessup, Pennsylvania for the annual

"La Festa dei Ceri," on Saturday, May 27, 2006. On the train trip up the Lackawanna Valley to Jessup, passengers will be serenaded by authentic costumed Italian singers and children and learn the fascinating history of "La Festa dei Ceri."

Known locally as "St. Ubaldo Day," the festival is an annual celebration brought to America by immigrants from Gubbio, Italy in 1911 to pay tribute to St. Ubaldo. Started in the tenth century, the festival is still honored in Gubbio. The Jessup event features "The Race of the Saints," and also offers carnival rides, artwork, ethnic gourmet food, wine tasting, and historic town tours.

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority has partnered with Steamtown to offer this new excursion as part of the Heritage Valley

Station Stops program, and has awarded a grant to the Borough of Jessup to support the festival itself.

"Many residents in the borough are from families who immigrated to the Lackawanna Valley directly from Gubbio looking for jobs and opportunity. The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority is proud to sponsor 'St. Ubaldo Day."

The train departs the Steamtown boarding platform at 3:30 p.m., and returns at 9:15 p.m.Ticket are \$21 for adults (17 to 61 years old), \$19 for 62 and older, and \$10 for children 6 to 16. Children under 6



Electric City Trolley Station & Museum "Tracks in Time" Video Garners National Award

video production highlighting the story of Scranton's electric trolley system has been recognized as part of the 27th Annual National Telly Awards. The program, "Tracks in Time: The Story of Scranton's Electric Trolley," was selected as an award winner in the Video Documentary Category.

The program chronicles the story of how Scranton became the birthplace of the first commercially successful electric streetcar system in the nation, and is now commonly referred to as The Electric City. The program was jointly

produced by Barbara Colangelo, Lackawanna County Director of Historic Facilities (including Electric CityTrolley Station and Museum) and edventures consulting inc. "Tracks in Time" recently had its local broadcast premiere on WVIA-TV, Channel 44.

The Telly Awards were founded in 1980 to showcase outstanding non-network and cable TV programming. The awards also honor local, regional, and cable TV commercials as well as video and film productions. Previous winners in the programming category include Walt Disney Studios, ESPN, The History Channel, MSNBC, National Geographic, and others.
