The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority announces the release of a new guidebook to the region, "Pennsylvania's Northeast Treasures: A Visitor's Guide to Scranton, the Lackawanna Valley, and Beyond." This is LHVA's first publishing venture under its new imprint, the Heritage Valley Press.

Author Daniel K. Perry takes readers on a wide-ranging tour of the beautiful Lackawanna Valley, including its visitor attractions, outdoor recreational opportunities, ethnic festivals, tasty delicacies, and more. From the tops of the ridgelines to the subterranean world of the anthracite miner, the guide is a fascinating and comprehensive look at Scranton and the surrounding communities.

The guidebook includes over 150 spectacular photos by a dozen local

photographers many of whom donated their work to the project. The photographers included Jack Carling, Kenny Ganz, Pat Rokos Henneforth, Brian Manning, Greg Raymond, Amelia Suraci, Mel Wolk,

Guy Cali, and Rich Banick. Their combined talent add immeasurably to the book's visual appeal. The photographers were recognized and honored at a celebration on Tuesday, November 14, 2006 at Keystone College in LaPlume, PA.

Dr. Walter Barbe also was honored at the event. Dr. Barbe was the editor-in-chief of the new guidebook, and he brought extraordinary expertise as an author and editor to the project. A prolific author and renowned educator, Dr. Barbe was the editor-in-chief of "Highlights for Children" magazine for twenty-five years.
